TRIP UPDATES

South Lake Tahoe:

First, let me remind you that you need your Vail Pass confirmation number to pick up your Pass. I have emailed them to those people who were smart enough to purchase them. Don't forget to put that paperwork on your phone, in your ski boot, somewhere where you can't forget it. Speaking of forgetting passes, guess who forgot to take their Mammoth pass to the slopes?

Second, there are several new members on this trip. Your attendance at the pre-trip party is $\underline{really\ important}$. This event was originally scheduled for February 10^{th} . If our meeting location doesn't change that will be a conflict with the regular meeting date. We will have no choice but to move the pre-trip party to Monday, February 8^{th} . Please reserve this date as a "fall-back" option.

Third, the dates of the trip are from 2/20 to 2/27. That means you will be checking into your rooms on the 20^{th} . Check in time is 4 PM. Your five day group lift tickets start on **Sunday**, 2/21. The welcome party is scheduled for Sunday. If you are driving up on Saturday you won't miss the party if you arrive later in the evening.

Most importantly, there are still hotel rooms available for the trip. Now is the time to sign up and pay your money. When you RSVP on Meet Up that does **not** hold a space for you. By now, it is pretty safe to forecast there will be snow in the Sierra. Heavenly and NorthStar both have excellent snow making capabilities. We will be skiing at those two resorts plus at Kirkwood. Of all the resorts in Tahoe, Kirkwood is my personal favorite. Kirkwood typically has the deepest, driest snow in the area. The resort has a 2000 vertical drop and over 2300 acres of terrain. The runs vary from the calm groomers for beginners to steep cornices and cliffs.

There will be a group ski day at NorthStar. As the name implies this resort is on the north shore of the lake. This lay-back mountain has 3,170 skiable acres. A gondola takes you from the base area to the top of the mountain. The elevation is 6,800 feet. There are long cruiser slopes on the back side. The

longest run is Logger's Loop. It is 1.4 miles of yahoo skiing. 60% of the slopes are intermediate and 27% are for our more advanced skiers. There are 7 trails and 600+ acres of **gladed tree skiing**.

Heavenly is the largest of the resorts in the Tahoe area. There are 97 trails and 28 chairlifts. There are 4,800 skiable acres and 3,500 vertical feet. The top elevation is 10,067. That is the highest ski run at Lake Tahoe. For the boarders, in the group, there are 3 terrain parks. Mott Canyon and Killebrew Canyon is where the hot dog skiers will be found. Most important for the SLO Skiers, the gondola accessing this massive ski area is a really easy walk (even in ski boots) from Forest Suites.

The town of South Lake Tahoe sits right on the shores of the lake. There are a number of world class casinos for the gamblers in the group. The hotels have great shows and restaurants. There are ski shops very near the Forest Suites. Across the street is a full service grocery and liquor store. This amazing combination of great lodging, skiing and entertainment is yours.... Gladed Tree Skiing

Glade skiing is alpine skiing through trees off-trail or on a defined woods trail.^[1] Glades are variously sought for their solitude, beauty, or caches of ungroomed powder. Woods also tend to hold better snow longer thanks to the shade and shelter trees provide.

Glade skiing is inherently more dangerous than skiing on trails and usually reserved for experts, though moderate glade terrain exists. Hazards such as cliffs or



streams may or may not be blocked off by ski patrol. Other dangers include tree wells,, logs, stumps, and the trees themselves. Equipment required includes a ski helmet, ski goggles, and gloves all to protect against the trees and underbrush. Glade riders need to be fit and agile to negotiate trees and hidden obstacles such as tree wells or concealed root systems.

Ski resorts may have defined glade trails, ungroomed glade areas, or boundary-to-boundary policies.

SUNSHINE VILLAGE GETS CANADA'S FIRST HEATED CHAIRLIFT

The Banff area's Sunshine Village is building the first heated lift in Canada complete with footrests and bubble covers. It's called the TeePee Town LX and will open this November!

NEW LIFTS AT U.S. RESORTS

Utah's Solitude Mountain Resort, now owned by Deer Valley, has upgraded the Summit chair to an express quad, cre-

ating a faster route to the expert terrain of Honeycomb Canyon.

Vail Resort is swapping out the frontside Avanti Express, which was a quad, with a high-speed six-pack with a loading conveyor belt in the hopes of dispersing skiers more quickly from the Lionshead.

Purgatory, in Colorado, has a new high-speed quad chairlift and three new runs just west of the new lift.

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SKI SEASON HAS BEGUN

BROOMFIELD, Colo. – Nov. 11, 2015 - Another in a series of intense winter storms will make for this season's first hat trick for skiers across Colorado, Utah and Lake Tahoe, where some of the <u>most popular ski resorts</u> are opening at a record pace.

"This early-November storm is taking a perfect path across the western US, dropping snow on most major mountain ranges, including Tahoe, northern Utah, and most of Colorado," notes Joel Gratz, founding meteorologist at OpenSnow.com. The Far West Ski Foundation

The Far West Ski Foundation has had a busy year. In July, we granted two scholarships (\$1000) to the Fly Girls Program of Women's Ski Jumping for Development Camp; which involves young women from the USA as young as 12, and is the development program for the national team, now taken over by the U.S. Ski Team.

VVP and its partners annually draw rehabilitation patients (and clinicians if needed) from the major Armed Forces hospitals - Walter Reed, Brooks, and Balboa, bringing them to Vail at no cost to the patient.



This month, we are offering grants to racing schools in support of the FWSA/FWSF Athletic Scholarship Program, in the amount of \$11,425. The 13 scholar-athletes are trained by 9 ski racing schools in four states. This is the program's 12th year in existence.

We depend on you, fellow believers in the worth and future of snowsports, to help sustain the Far West Ski Foundation and its missions - Alpine ski racing, adaptive snowsports, the development of women's ski jumping, and preservation of the legacy of snowsports. No American man had won an Olympic Gold Medal in alpine skiing until 1984, when two accomplished the feat. Bill Johnson won gold in the downhill, while Phil Mahre was the champion in the slalom. Phil's brother Steve won the silver medal in the slalom in that same year. In 2006, in Torino, the U.S. earned two golds in alpine: Ted Ligety in the men's combined and Julia Mancuso in women's giant slalom.

Battle of the Drones Heats Up On The Slopes

As the use of recreational drones, to film video, is rapidly increasing in popularity, ski resorts — and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) — are scrambling to determine how to deal with this rapidly emerging new technology on the slopes. Fearing impacts with other skiers, lifts or other infrastructure, the National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) has drafted its own set of rules banning the flying of personal and commercial aerial drones at ski areas.



Ski resort operators fear that without taking preemptive action, aerial video drones could one day become as ubiquitous on the slopes as GoPro POV cameras are today. Violation of the NSAA rules could result in drone confiscation and/or loss of skiing privileges, and in some areas potentially regulatory fines as well. At the same time, the NSAA is urging the FAA to allow resorts to fly their own commercial drones to assist in lift inspections, search and rescue operations and avalanche mitigation.

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
