

Please bring a delicious appetizer to share and your favorite beverage. I have new floors in my house. It is a "NO SHOES" house, so please bring warm socks or slippers to wear. Mardi Gras theme; costumes and/or masks are encouraged but not required!

Directions (heading south): Take 101 S to Pismo Beach and exit at 4th Street. When you come to the stop sign, turn right and go one block to 4th street, and turn right again and proceed east over the freeway to James Way. Turn right on James Way, and after one block turn right on Shamrock Lane. Proceed to the very last street and turn left on Irish Way. Since Irish Way is horseshoe-shaped, there are two signs for Irish Way; go to the second one and turn left. Once on Irish way, go down the block about halfway, and look for the tan house on the left. (It is the only house with large, high shrubbery in the front yard.)

Directions (heading north): See directions heading south; the only difference is that once you take the 4th Street exit, you turn right onto 4th Street for just a short distance until you turn right on James Way. You are already on the east side of the freeway.


























There is More to Ski Week Than Skiing!

One, we add a bit of money to the actual cost of the trip. Two, comps. Comps are what we received from the lodging properties, airlines, and mountain for bringing a group to the area. Comps are a big reason it helps to travel in a group. Of course anyone who has ever had a problem will tell you the power of the group is a great asset if you need help. Third, our club donates \$25 for each member on the trip. Good job auction attendees. Here are some of the other fun activities included in each trip:



All of that is covered by our modest fee for the bus of \$60 per person. I'm always asked, "Why don't you include this in the package?" Whitefish exemplifies why it is an additional charge. No bus is cost-effective for 22 people. Believe me, I have explored ALL the options. Okay, so now you are at the airport. You have all your friends to watch your bag if you need to go to the potty. There are friends to follow in case you are confused. Someone in the group is always savvy about those daunting kiosk check-ins. Get the picture? You are not alone. Then when you get to your destination, a charter bus picks you up. You don't have to struggle with renting a car, or figuring out ground transportation. On the way to the resort, in the case of Whistler, we will be stopping for a delicious buffet dinner. The condo people will get a grocery stop as well. That helps avoid paying high resort prices for groceries. In Whitefish, all of us are in condos. The bus will stop for a grocery and liquor stop—again, saving you money. 

As I called and set up the donation appointments with Woods Humane Society and The Land Conservancy of SLO County a very nice recognition took place at each organization. When I introduced myself and asked if they remembered me from last year the response was very hearty, warm and welcome. "Of course we remember you Michael and the SLO Skiers." I was impressed and pleased for a goal had been accomplished. We, the SLO Skiers, have made ourselves known and remembered by key community organizations. Each organization we have donated to remembered us a year later. This recognition proves to me that SLO Skiers have become not just a ski club but a ski, sport and social club with annual philanthropic goals of helping those in need in the community we live in. Congratulations on your willingness to put forward the compassion and funds to help make SLO Skiers be a known, contributing member of our community.

We have made our first donations of 2017. On January 4, 2017, a \$300 check was delivered to Woods Humane Society. Receiving the check was Joy Miller, Development and Outreach Manager. She, Executive Director Jill Tucker and all the staff at Woods are extremely appreciative of our donation and our philanthropy program. The Land Conservancy of SLO County received a \$225 check from us also on January 4, 2017. Receiving the check was Lauren Meers, Development and Outreach Manager. Lauren asked when we can reschedule our hike at the Pismo Preserve. I told her when Marv recovers from back surgery we'll be ready to go and that we had better plan on two hikes due to the popular response to the hike by our club members.

Our shampoo, soaps and lotion collections are going very well also. Thus far we have collected: 33.5 pounds at the May and June meetings; 38 pounds at the September and October meetings; 37 pounds at the November, December and January meetings. Our total year-to-date is 108.5 pounds of soaps and lotions. Thanks so much and keep them coming. All our shampoos, soaps and lotions are split equally between El Camino Homeless Organization in Atascadero (North County's shelter) and the Maxine Lewis Memorial Shelter in SLO (SLO/South County's shelter). Last year we collected approximately 142 pounds of shampoo, soaps and lotions.

The first Mardi Gras took place on March 3rd, 1699, when the French explorers, Iberville and Bienville, landed in what is now Louisiana. Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday," reflecting the celebration of eating richer, fatty foods before the day of Ash Wednesday, fasting and religious obligations associated with the penitential season of Lent. People wore masks so they could abandon social constraints and celebrate with everyone. The traditional colors of Mardi Gras are purple, representing justice, green for faith, and gold for power. The celebration includes music, parades, floats, long beads, and doubloons (coins). The carnival season is surrounded by mystery, secrets and traditions that go back over 300 years. Some of the secrets will be revealed by our own Kathleen O'Neill at her wine down on the 26th from 4–7 p.m.

SLO Skiers club elections are upon us and I encourage all members interested to inquire about open positions. Fran Long is happy to answer any questions on current open positions. All positions are on a volunteer basis for one year. I want to thank all board members, both present, past and future, for volunteering their time and effort in creating such a fun and wonderful organization full of traditional as well as new and exciting activities.
