




Bonnie Long has diligently collected your money and recorded who is doing what. That is a huge job. THANK YOU Bonnie!!

WHITEFISH UPDATE:

Located in northwest Montana is the Big Mountain Whitefish. The Whitefish Mountain Resort is a short 8 miles (13km) from the gorgeous town of Whitefish. The nearest major city is Kalispell,. Kalispell is where our flight will be landing. By road, Whitefish is only 65 miles southeast from the Canadian border and only 109 miles from Fernie in Canada.

The latest news on snow fall at Whitefish is good. There is a storm on the way. The mountain plans on opening on December 7th.

Glacier National Park

There are three distinct areas to enjoy on this trip:

First of course is the mountain. There are 3,000 skiable acres with 105 marked trails. There are vast amounts of bowl and tree skiing. Snow-ghosts will join you as you glide down the slopes. The longest run is 3.3 miles and is called Hellfire. YAHOO. Yes, Whitefish Mountain Resort is BIG. You can ski and board on all 4 sides of the mountain. 12% of the mountain is for beginners, 40% for intermediates, 46% Advanced and 6% will be enjoyed by our experts. There is enough steep, trees, glades and bowls to provide ample off-piste challenge for the "rat pack". We will enjoy a complimentary Ambassador Tour. The Ambassadors' primary goal is to orient you to the Mountain. You will find your dream terrain and have the time of your life!

At the mountain village there are several bars and restaurants. We will be staying at Morning Eagle or the Kintla Lodge. Both properties are ski in and out condos. The standard package will be either 2 bedroom 2 bath or 3 bedroom 3 bath condos. If you want to pay a little more you can upgrade to a private one bedroom condo. The farewell dinner is planned at The Summit House restaurant 7000 'up the mountain. You will dine while overlooking Glacier National Park and the sparkling lights of Flathead Valley.

Second is the town. It is a quaint small mountain town. No mega malls and chain restaurants. The atmosphere is easy going. The prices are much more affordable than in a glitzy resort. There are plenty of down home type restaurants and bars. WhiteFish is a year round sports town. You will have opportunity to shop in small specialty stores.

Third and finally is nearby Glacier National Park If you are a skier you should plan on taking a day to tour the park. The scenery will blow you away. The quiet and majesty of the park in winter will stick in your memory forever. If you aren't a skier this is a good reason to sign up for the trip. There are wonderful cross country ski areas. Snow mobiling will give you a thrill as you explore this natural wonder. Snow shoeing will give you a good work out.
